


Figure 1. Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 2. Forward Current vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 3. Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Angular Displacement




Figure 4. Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage

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


Figure 5. Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 6. Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current




Figure 7. Relative Intensity vs. Wavelength




Figure 8. Forward Voltage vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 9. Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Figure 10. Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Ambient Temperature



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


Figure 11. Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current




Figure 12. Relative Intensity vs. Wavelength




Figure 13. Forward Voltage vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 14. Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Figure 15. Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 16. Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current

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




Figure 17. Relative Intensity vs. Wavelength



PACKAGE DIMENSIONS in millimeters






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REEL DIMENSIONS in millimeters



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


TAPE DIMENSIONS in millimeters



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DRY PACKING

The reel is packed in an anti-humidity bag to protect the devices from absorbing moisture during transportation and storage.



FINAL PACKING

The sealed reel is packed into a cardboard box. A secondary cardboard box is used for shipping purposes.

RECOMMENDED METHOD OF STORAGE

Dry box storage is recommended as soon as the aluminium bag has been opened to prevent moisture absorption. The following conditions should be observed, if dry boxes are not available:

- Storage temperature 10 °C to 30 °C
- Storage humidity \leq 60 % RH max.

After more than 1 year under these conditions moisture content will be too high for reflow soldering.


In case of moisture absorption, the devices will recover to the former condition by drying under the following condition:

192 h at 40 °C + 5 °C/-0 °C and < 5 % RH (dry air/ nitrogen) or

96 h at 60 $^{\circ}\text{C}$ +5 $^{\circ}\text{C}$ and < 5 % RH for all device containers or

24 h at 100 °C +5 °C not suitable for reel or tubes.

An EIA JEDEC standard JESD22-A112 level 2 label is included on all dry bags.

ESD PRECAUTION

Proper storage and handling procedures should be followed to prevent ESD damage to the devices especially when they are removed from the antistatic shielding bag. Electro-static sensitive devices warning labels are on the packaging.
